## Daniel and Maude Walters House



**Daniel and Maude Walters House, 100 S. Delaware**  
Known for its use of limestone and a low hipped roof, the Daniel and Maude Walters home is an excellent example of the

Craftsman-Tudor style of the early 20<sup>th</sup> Century.

Built in 1928, the home was originally designed, built, and owned by Daniel and Maude Walters. The house was one of the first in the emerging neighborhoods of western Manhattan, made accessible by the new automobile that allowed residents to build and live farther from the city center. The lots were originally acquired from Sam Kimble, a lawyer and later district judge who also constructed the Kimble Castle to the west of the subject property.

The house has remained in its original condition, with only a few minor improvements and alterations, such as the addition of a master bathroom, replacement of the garage doors, construction of concrete patios, removal of a failing furnace chimney on the rear roof slope, and minor remodeling of a secondary kitchen and bathroom spaces. Due to excellent preservation, the Daniel and

Maude Walters House is one of Manhattan's best examples of Craftsmen architecture from the early 1900s.
